The music teacher, Elke Eble-Streisslberger, presents a full program using instruments. The two sessions were for grades 1-3 and grade 7 respectively. The children were currently learning about Cuba and its culture, including music. A large poster about Cuba and related topics was displayed in the hall across from the music room. Joaquin first taught the students how to play a multitude of percussion instruments. He then taught them a song that emanated from the slaves working at the docks and in fields, and had them reproduce the rhythms, song, and dance. He and his assistant,

Cuban percussionist Dyalis Machado Migueles accompanied them. It became a history lesson as well as a music lesson. Comments from the teacher are attached.

Tim Shia Trio Workshop, May 12th 2015 at Westview Centennial Secondary School, Grades 10-12, in a high needs area, Jane and Finch Toronto

The Westview teacher, Andre Soares, has taught his students keyboard, steel pan, guitar, trumpet, trombone, flute, clarinet, saxophone, bass and drums. Tim Shia, in collaboration with Mr. Soares, prepared and presented a workshop based on improvisation.

The Trio first performed for the students. Tim provided the students with a sheet on tips for soloing. He and his trio played examples of improvisation followed by an interactive discussion. Tim and Andre then asked each student to improvise numerous times, using three notes chosen from a song they had been learning - a first time experience for most of the students. The students

were well mannered, attentive and engaged. It was a very interactive program, and useful tool, which Mr. Soares can build on in the future.
